Message from the director

Ssue related to disability is a big challenge for Cambodia, especially for the most vulnerable Cambodian; those are the one who are the most likely to be affected by disabilities and in the same time, they are the ones who have the less means to face consequences related to this issue. Currently it is still quite common that very poor families are giving their children with disabilities to trafficker in exchange of the promise of a monthly income. A lot of Children with Disabilities are also being abandoned to hospitals where the families are originally coming with the excuse to find a treatment for their children.

Since its creation, Damnok Toek provides services to the most vulnerable children in Cambodia. Children With Disabilities as one of the most vulnerable persons in Cambodia are part of Damnok Toek's direct beneficiaries. Since 2003 Damnok Toek developed a project dedicated to Children With Disabilities. With 15 years of experience working with Children With Disabilities, curently Damnok Toek is recognized as a major actor in this field. That is why regularly Damnok Toek received requests related to Children With Disabilities. Those request come from different organizations such as the Ministry of Social Affairs (MoSVY), the UNICEF, partners NGOs and sometime hospital. The nature of these requests varies from material or technical support to accepting Children With Disabilities referral into our projects.

Damnok Toek is working hard with those organizations to find the best solution for Children With Disabilities allowing them to access to their needs. Services provided includes: housing, medical care, referral, physiotherapy and rehabilitation care, training and job placement, material support and when it is possible reintegration through families' reconciliation.

So far Damnok Toek efforts were successful and several success story with Children With Disabilities that were able to find their place into the Cambodian society happen during the past 15 years.

This success is priceless, especially when we see the progress made by the Children With Disabilities in our care. We really want to thanks all our donors, our technical partners, our dedicated staff who made this success possible along the years. We also want to launch a call for those who want to help Damnok Toek to continue developing innovative projects for Children With Disabilities in Cambodia. Currently our organization is looking for more supports both technical and financial, to improve its Disability program and in particular to work closely with Children With Disabilities in Neak Loeung communities.

I. DAMNOK TOEK AT A GLANCE

WHO WE ARE

Our history

1997

Goutte d'eau Switzerland started to work in Cambodia and established a centre for vulnerable children in Neak Loeung.

1999

Following a request from the Government, Goutte d'Eau Switzerland implemented a project in Poipet to rehabilitate children using substances and reintegrate victims of trafficking in Poipet.

2001

The project in Neak Loeung was registered as a Cambodian NGO by the Ministry of Interior under the name Damnok Toek Cambodia.

2003

The project in Poipet was registered as a Cambodian NGO by the Ministry of Interior under the name Damnok Toek Poipet.

Damnok Toek Cambodia and Goutte d'eau Switzerland opened a shelter for children with disabilities in Phnom Penh.

2012

Damnok Toek Cambodia and Damnok Toek Poipet merged into a single organisation called Damnok Toek (Goutte d'eau), operating as a new entity from January 2013 on.

2017

Damnok Toek (Goutte d'eau) and Goutte d'eau Switzerland opened a social business, including a residence and a farm, for young adults with mental disabilities in Kep.

Our vision

Our vision is to assist all vulnerable children, particularly:

- > Trafficking victims
- > Street-working or street-living children
- > Children and young people living with physical or mental disabilities
- > Victims of any kind of exploitation or abuse.

Our mission

Our mission is to enable each vulnerable or marginalised child to realise his or her rights, to have all of its basic needs met, and to get an opportunity to develop its individual capacity.

With the support of communities, government and civil society representatives, DT identifies and implements responses to enhance access to a better future for the children most in need.

Preventing

Child abuse, substance abuse and child trafficking both internally within Cambodia and across borders.

Rehabiliting

Young substance abusers, disabled and traumatised children.

Integrating

Neglected children and street children into Cambodian society through non formal education, vocational training, job placement and formal education at public schools.

Reintegrating

Trafficked, disabled, and runaway children into their families of origin when possible, or into their communities or villages.

Neak Loeung

Since 1997, Damnok Toek has been running a drop-in centre and a residential shelter in Neak Loeung. These facilities provide vulnerable children from both the communities and DT's residential centre with access to counselling, non-formal education, vocational training and medical care.

Poipet

Beginning work in Poipet in 1999, DT has been assisting vulnerable children and their families through a range of targeted health, education and vocational programs. Located in the north west of Cambodia at the main border crossing to Thailand, Poipet can be an exceptionally hazardous place for children.

In 2016, Damnok Toek opened a social business, a farm for young adults with mental disabilities. This project was created to respond to the needs of young adults with severe mental disabilities who could not continue to live with the children of the Handicap Center.

2. HIGHLIGHT OF 2018

Grand opening of the Futures Office

n 2017 Damnok Toek decided to revise its strategy toward employment support both for youth and families. Until 2017 Damnok Toek's employment support approach was made through two main projects:

-Income generating activities which provide small loan to families, in order to start small businesses.

-Vocational training which provide skills for different jobs such as motorbike repair, hair dresser, beauty salon.

Unfortunately this approach became out-of-date, especially concerning Damnok Toek's Vocational Training program. Indeed for the past five years, Cambodia known a rapid economic and societal development and the different Vocational trainings offered by Damnok Toek was no more in

step with Cambodian job market and Cambodian youths' aspirations. Indeed curently, principal sectors of recruitment in Cambodia are related to textile industry, construction work or tourism. Knowing that Vocational Training for these kind or job already exist in Cambodia, Damnok Toek decided to step by step to close its own Vocational Training centers. To compensate those closures, Damnok Toek has developed partnership with different existing vocational trainings in order to be able to offer solutions for youth who might want to learn a new job.

However, Damnok Toek couldn't settle for only providing Vocational Training referal to youth in need of employment support. That is why Damnok Toek has developed the project of Futures Office. Shadowing many of the services provided through Friends International's 'Futures' Project, this project aims to provide a holistic approach to employment services in Cambodia. It consist on the the creation

of a one-stop job resource office, which provides referrals for training and job leads, information regarding vocational training, and technical support to assist with resume building and computer training. Youth utilizing this office can access 'one-off' services, or long-term support through the care of trained case managers and counselors.

In the first quarter of 2018, Damnok Toek prepared carefully the opening of the Futures Office. During this period a new team was hired and trained by Friend International, a facility was identified to be rented and all the materil was bought. Finally, Damnok Toek's Futures Office opened its door in April 2018.

The beginning of the project was not easy. Indeed, despite a good communication within Poipet communities, very few clients dared to push our door to ask for employment support. In Cambodia, employment support already exists but all these services are commercial services, when they are not purely scams. As a consequence a lot of people didn't trust in this new project and the benefits that could bring them. To face this problem, Damnok Toek intensified its communication and patiently explained to people in the communities the importance of the employment support.

Meanwhile, the Futures Office's team has developed several partnerships with private company in order to be able to provide job placement to the new client. The success of the first job placements encouraged other beneficiaries to come to the Futures Office.

Finally in 2018, Damnok Toek counseled 146 different people through the Futures Office project. On these 146 people 80 received soft skills training such as building a resume, interview training or computer training. More important, Damnok Toek succeeded in finding a job for 34 people thanks to 6 partnerships signed with Poipet private companies. Those results are very encouraging especially because the number of beneficiaries is more important month after month. Damnok Toek is very confident to be able to multiple those results by 4.

Opening of the New Disability Program

In July 2018, Damnok Toek started a new project that changed lives of many Children with Disabilities (CWD) in Cambodia. Facing discrimination and neglect, and being exposed to many dangers on the streets, abandoned CWD were placed in Small Group Homes (SGH), a family-like environment that contributes to the proper development of each child and guarantees their rights to develop, learn, grow, and participate.

Following recommendations from UNICEF and ISS (International Social Services), the project arose from the need to protect children with severe

disabilities, once they could not be placed into any type of kinship or foster care due to the amount of dedication and supervision they require. Since July 2018, DT has taken care of 16 children with severe disabilities and has contributed significantly to their development, increasing their chances of independence and success in their future lives.

Allied to the SGH, DT opened a Day Care Center (DCC) that holds an educational space and also two rooms dedicated to Physical Therapy and Sensory Stimulation. The DCC is connected to the SGH and provides CWD with access to the rehabilitative and educational care they mostly need.

Both projects are well connected and are big advocators for rehabilitation, rights, and protection of children with disabilities. Amongst the main goals of the project, you might find the following:

- > Basic-life support and provision of a family-like environment to Children with Severe Disabilities.
- >Provision of life skills training, educational, and recreational activities that ensure children's rights to play and participate in activities with other peers.
- >CWD exposition to basic Cambodian costumes, traditions, and norms of conduct.
- >Participation of CWD in the community.
- >Provision of Physical Therapy and Sensory Stimulation to CWD.
- >Provision of a child-friendly environment for stimulation of child development and increasing in social skills.

Damnok Toek won the Prix Caritas 2018

ach June since 2003, Caritas Switzerland has awarded its Prix Caritas to a different personality. This prize was created to honor person "for their admirable commitment, their outstanding work in the social sphere, in development cooperation and in intercultural understanding". In 2018, Caritas Switzerland chose to attribute this prize to Sovanarith SAM as the director of Damnok Toek. Through this prize Caritas wanted to reward Damnok Toek and its work toward the marginalized children since its creation in 1997. Caritas was especially impressed by Damnok Toek's project in Poipet. In average those projects provide services to 3500 children and their families each year.

In 2018, the ceremony was held on June 15th in Lucerne (Switzerland). During the ceremony, Yves Serra, CEO and President of Georg Fischer as well as President of the 'Clean Water' Foundation hand the prize over Sovannarith SAM, praising him for its long commitment: "Sovannarith Sam is always guided by a threefold perspective. By giving children and young people a roof over their head in the drop-in centres, he is providing life-saving protection. But he doesn't stop at that. Through education and training, he endeavors to reintegrate the children into society and to give them a future. And lastly, by raising awareness, he wants to prevent children from being deprived of rights and protection."



The prize of 10,000CHF (10,000\$), was only use to finance Damnok Toek's project in Neak Loeung and Poipet. Damnok Toek wants to thanks Caritas Switzerland for the great honor of receiving this prize, it gives our team some extra motivation to continue our work and serve the most marginalized children in Cambodia.

Improve right based and child friendly aproach

or the wellbeing of the children attending Damnok Toek's activities and accordingly to UNICEF recommendations, Damnok Toek has adapted its projects to respect the right based and child friendly approach.

The right based and child friendly approach is made up of seven principles based from the UN Convention on the Right of the Child. Those principles are:

- -Respect children dignity.
- -Interdependence and indivisibility of all children rights.
- -The best interest of the children as a priority.
- -Importance of children participation.
- -Non-discrimination.
- -Transparency and accountability.
- -Respect the life and development of each child.

The right based and child friendly approach is already included in Damnok Toek's vision and objectives, as well as in Damnok Toek's Child protection policy. However, we decided to improve this approach within Damnok Toek's project with two main strategies.

The first strategy was to train Damnok Toek's staff to learn new how to take into account the specific needs of Damnok Toek's beneficiaries. Indeed, Damnok Toek is taking care of vulnerable and marginalized children. Some of them are growing up in difficult social context and may have difficulties in learning or interacting with other individuals. With the support and assistance of Caritas Switzerland, the staff of Damnok Toek was provided with a training to learn Essence of Learning (EoL), a child-centred and holistic approach to Education in Emergencies that addresses the specific needs of children who are growing up in crisis contexts. It links pedagogical and psycho-social components to foster children's resilience and their ability to learn.

Then, Damnok Toek decided to enhance all its facilities to provide better environments to all children. The objective was to create more child friendly space with more decoration, colorful paintings and more plants. The idea was to do those improvements through a participatory process, including Damnok Toek's staff and children.

A lot of DIY decorations were created by the children, from plant pots made in plastic bottles or tires, decoration made from palm branch to garland made of paper. Beautiful paintings were made with stencil and projection technique. Dozens of plants were grown and several vegetable gardens were created.

We can already see the positive impact of those improvements. Children are feeling proud to participate in the improvement of Damnok Toek's project, most of them are feeling more relax in their new environment. On their side, Damnok Toek's staff appreciated a lot their training and feels more confident to deal with Damnok Toek's beneficiaries

3. PROJECTS ACHIEVEMENTS 2018

DROP IN CENTER

he Drop In Center offers a safe and childfriendly space for street children to take a break from their daily work.

Children can also benefit from a daily twohour literacy and numeracy class, recreational activities, meals and a safe shelter at night.

Outreach takes place regularly in the streets, in rubbish dumps, directly in the communities and where children work on the Thai/Cambodian border. Each month mobile libraries and workshops are organized in the communities to sensitize children, youth and adults on topics affecting them such as trafficking, the importance of education, HIV, substance abuse, and sexual exploitation. A Mobile Rehabilitation unit travels to the communities 4 times a week to identify and help children using drugs.

CHILDSAFE DROP IN CENTER

he Border Drop In Center is a reception centre housed at the deportation re-entry location on the border of Thailand and Cambodia. Damnok Toek's role at this location is to identify unaccompanied children deported from Thailand, and to provide these children with emergency case management and referrals to make sure they are provided with appropriate care or, when possible, reunited with their families. This is done to reduce the likelihood of unsafe migratory behaviours, as well as the possibility of further trafficking or exploitation.

TRANSITIONAL CARE FACILITIES AND GROUP HOME

he Transitional Care Facility Project (TCF) and Group Home Project (GH) are residential services provided by Damnok Toek. These services are segmented and grouped by age and need. Transitional Care Facilities offer long-term residential care for children between six and 14 years old, while Damnok Toek Group Homes are for youth between 14 and 18 years old.

26 children stayed in the TCF, 12 of them were reintegrated either into their family, or another NGO, or a Group Home.

RECEPTION CENTER

he Reception Centre Project (RC) offers effective and sustainable solutions for victims of human trafficking, deported and repatriated children, with an emphasis on assistance delivery by grassroots organizations; including, but not limited to psycho-social support, family tracing and assessment, housing, food, legal aid, access to justice, medical care, training and sustainable livelihoods.

INCOME GENERATION ACTIVITIES

he Income Generation Activity Scheme (IGAS) aims to help families gain a regular income and reduce the risk of households resorting to their children's labour to gain additional income. The participating families commit to send their children to school, to take good care of them and to prevent them from working on the streets. DT provides loans of up to \$300 to be used by the families to start small businesses. They are also offered training and close support to ensure the sustainability of the business.

FUTURES OFFICE

he Futures Office program primarily welcomes young adults from DT's residential centers that cannot be reintegrated into public school. The students that graduate the program are given an apprenticeship at a local business.

The VT program and job placement are one of the main components of DT's reintegration strategy for young adults, offering them the possibility of becoming economically autonomous.

Young adults are given the opportunity to gain on the job experience and develop links in a real professional environment. DT has connections with other NGO apprenticeships, making it easier to transition into the formal employment sector.

NON FORMAL EDUCATION

he Non-Formal Education Project (NFE) is one of Damnok Toek's most unique and successful projects, as it offers non-traditional schooling to at-risk, marginalized, and vulnerable children who would otherwise have no educational options. Nine class levels are offered daily to an average of 300 children in Poipet and 150 children in Neak Loeung.

The program offers a morning and an afternoon session to make sure that the children have the opportunity to attend school whatever their work schedule is.



CHILDSAFE

Network "Childsafe" which aims to reduce the number of children living and working on the streets and to improve the protection of children from all forms of abuse. "ChildSafe members" are people from the communities (street sellers, Tuk Tuk drivers...) that are trained by DT's staff on child protection and how to identify at-risk children. A ChildSafe Hotline (24 hours a day/7 days a week) enables ChildSafe members, partners, or any person in need to call and report if a child is seen to be in an at-risk situation.

MEDICAL CLINIC

he Medical Clinics in Poipet and Neak Loeung provide care to the children in DT's projects as well as to the members of the community, giving them access to consultations and treatments for free or at a very low cost. Serious cases are referred to a hospital, mainly in Phnom Penh or Siem Reap. DT's medical care focuses on the reduction of child malnutrition. Due to their poor socio-economic circumstances, some mothers are not able to breastfeed their babies. DT supports several families with powdered milk to prevent malnutrition and child mortality.

HANDICAP CENTER FOR YOUNG ADULTS WITH MENTAL DISABILITIES

Damnok Toek's handicap center for young adults with mental disability was opened in 2016 by Goutte d'eau Switzerland. In 2018 this project was transfered to Damnok Toek. The objective of this project is to allow adults with mental disability to live their lives with dignity. To reach this objective, the project created a unique living environment, where residents by participing to the daily activities of the center are encouraged to be autonomous longside the center, Damnok Toek developed a social farm where residents can work and and earn their own living.

HANDICAP CENTER FOR CHILDREN WITH PHYSICAL AND MENTAL DISABILITIES

Damnok Toek's Neak Loeung centre shelters children and young people living with physical and/or mental disabilities. Many of the children are former street children, as well as children who were abandoned or trafficked. Residents benefit from medical care, physical therapy, occupational therapy, psychosocial support, and also attend school outside the centre when appropriate. DT's programs support the development of skills to reinforce the children's autonomy so that they can be reintegrated whenever possible, and to prevent further trafficking or exploitation.

Understanding the lack rehabilitation services and educational space for the development of their physical, functional, and social skills. To achieve so, CWD from the community will visit the DCC twice a week and spend two hours at a time, enjoying educational activities, physical therapy, and sensory stimulation activities. The program also focuses on the caregivers that should accompany the children at all times and are entitled to learn from the educators and medical assistant so they can give continuity of care in the home environment. Caregivers are also able to share experiences with each other and talk about their difficulties, barriers, and strategies to deal with their child's disability.

Below, the main goals of the project:


- > Identification of CWD within the community.
- > Provision of counseling and support to CWD parents and caregivers.
- > Provision of access to educational, recreational, life-skills training, and rehabilitation services to CWD from the community.
- > Assurance of children's rights to play and participate in activities with other peers.
- > Provision of disability awareness to parents, caregivers and other members of the community.

The opening of this program is planned for June 2019.


